

+BELIEVE AND READ

Enhancing Excellence READING LEVELS ON THE RISE



When Annunciation Catholic School in Minneapolis returned to in-person learning in September 2020, Principal Kari Zobel quickly saw the need for more reading instruction.

"We had a high percentage of second graders not reading at grade level because they had missed several months of in-person instruction during that critical first-grade year," Zobel said. "Fortunately, our teachers are trained in Believe and Read and knew how to meet those students' needs. Many students made phenomenal progress throughout the year."

The Catholic Schools Center of Excellence's Believe and Read initiative, in partnership with Groves Learning Organization and Cretin-Derham Hall, brings a structured, scientific approach to reading into K–3 Catholic school classrooms.

Helen Dahlman, a CSCOE excellence consultant, explained, "Believe and Read schools provide explicit instruction in phonic and phonemic awareness. They teach letters and sounds in a specific way, while using a multisensory approach, so kids who process differently can grasp the concepts."

Now in its third year at 44 Twin Cities area Catholic schools, Believe and Read aims to ensure that every student reads at or above grade level by fourth grade. That's the time, Dahlman emphasized, when kids move from learning to read to reading to learn.



"Typically, we see about 20% of students in Catholic schools not reading at grade level — and that's still too high," said CSCOE President Brian Ragatz. In schools participating in Believe and Read, that number drops to under 9% for third-grade students whose classrooms have used the program for at least one year. "That demonstrates how impactful this program can be," Ragatz added.

Data gathered from 33 schools during the 2020-21 school year reinforce Annunciation's experience that Believe and Read dramatically boosts reading levels. Fifty percent of students at high risk of reading failure in fall 2020 were found to no longer be in that category by spring 2021; they had already moved on to reading at or above grade level.

Also in fall 2020, 58% of new students to the program were reading at or above grade level. By the following spring, proficient readers had increased to 71%.

"You might wonder, 'Are the data real?' Yes, they're real," confirmed Beth Sable, a first-grade teacher at Annunciation who is becoming certified as the school's reading coach.

Allison Klint believes Sable's training through Believe and Read contributed to early intervention for her second-grade son, who has been diagnosed with dyslexia. "The teachers are able to really see where kids are, where they are struggling and can flag concerns sooner," Klint said. "I don't think my son would be where he is today without Believe and Read."



Increasing Enrollment CATHOLIC SCHOOLS SEE SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR OF GROWTH

Recent enrollment growth and impressive retention continue in the nearly 80 preschool to eighth-grade Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis, resulting in an increase of more than 1,200 students in the 2021-22 school year.

"This trend is reflective of the satisfaction families have in their school choice," said Kelly Refsnider, director of enrollment for the Catholic Schools Center of Excellence. "Academic excellence, just-right class sizes, transformational opportunities and staff members joyfully dedicated to their vocation have attracted interest that hasn't been seen in decades."

Student enrollment at Nativity of Mary Catholic School in Bloomington has increased more than 15% in the past three years.

"When I started as principal in the 2019-20 school year, our enrollment was 323 students," said Ryan Pajak, principal at Nativity of Mary. "In 2020-21, our enrollment was 352, and this year it's at 383."

Pajak noted that a major factor last year was the school's commitment to in-person learning. "Once we had people here, they stayed," he said. "Our new families resoundingly cited the community we have at Nativity as a major factor in their satisfaction."

CSCOE significantly helped Nativity of Mary attract and retain new students. CSCOE encouraged and supported the hiring of an admissions coordinator to help welcome new families. She outlines marketing strategies, helps streamline the admissions process and keeps new families engaged.

Pajak cited the value of CSCOE's quarterly Admissions & Marketing Squad meetings to connect with other Catholic schools and share

recruitment and retention ideas. CSCOE's Latino enrollment team is also instrumental in reaching families.

Pajak takes pride in nurturing personal faith lives, holding high academic standards and providing extracurricular opportunities, which have been cornerstones at Nativity of Mary.

"I was told when I started here that Nativity was Bloomington's bestkept secret," he said. "We are hoping to change that by cultivating a



CSCOE'S TOP 5 OF 2021

(1) SHINE ON: A SHOWCASE OF CATHOLIC SCHOOL TALENT

In partnership with Lundstrum Performing Arts, we hosted our third annual Shine On Showcase of Catholic School Talent for fourth- through eighth-grade students March 7 at Visitation School in Mendota Heights. Twenty-four students performed for a small live audience, and artwork from the 16 visual arts finalists was displayed throughout the program, which was streamed. CSCOE awarded the top finishers in both categories a monetary prize and provided a grant to the winners' schools for their arts programs.

(2) BIG BANG CATHOLIC STEM FAIR

More than 60 students in grades 3–8 from 22 Catholic schools in the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis showcased their research and experiments at our fourth annual Big Bang Catholic STEM Fair April 10 at St. Agnes School in St. Paul. Members of the Society of Catholic Scientists, as well as Col. Mike Hopkins, who was on a mission on the International Space Station, congratulated the students via videos. FOX9 meteorologist Jennifer McDermed presented student awards with CSCOE President Brian Ragatz.

Winners received family memberships to local museums, and the first-place winners in the third- to fifth-grade and sixth- to eighth-grade age brackets each won a trip to the Vatican Observatory in Arizona, as well as a \$500 grant to their schools' STEM programs, all provided by CSCOE.

Our Catholic school commercials aired on Cities 97.1, MPR News and KFAN FM 100.3, and we'll continue our KOOL108 Christmas commercials. As part of this back-to-school campaign, we also streamed commercials on iHeartRadio, produced digital ads, launched four billboards across the Twin Cities and staffed a booth at the Minnesota State Fair. SMALL-TOWN SCHOOL REALIZES BIG-TIME DREAM

St. John the Baptist in Jordan adds middle school

Even through the COVID-19 pandemic, Catholic schools are finding creative ways to thrive. St. John the Baptist Catholic School in Jordan is one of them. Next fall, it will open a middle school for seventh- and eighthgrade students.



"We take good risks," said Father Neil Bakker, pastor of St. John the Baptist. "It's a disciple's mentality. We trust in the Lord's providence and take one step at a time."

'Always the dream'

Not long ago, enrollment was declining at the preschool through sixth grade Catholic school. The public middle school started in fifth grade, so many families were leaving after fourth grade.

"We knew we needed to do something drastic," Father Bakker said.

A middle school expansion was always the dream. Fortunately, the school had an unused second-floor space from an educational facility built in 2003. Since then, the St. John the Baptist community had been paying off debt and praying for the right opportunity to grow again.

But finishing the space to accommodate middle school classrooms would cost more than \$2 million — a high price to fund in a small community amid the uncertainty of a pandemic. Father Bakker called together his "dream team" of parish and school leadership, including a long-time school parent, to explore the school's growth. Everyone was on board.

"Over the past 20 years, so many dedicated educators, parents and parishioners gave their all to keep the dream alive," said middle school teacher Suzanne Colling.

In fall 2020, Father Bakker met with an architect and builder, the project received approval, and fundraising began in March 2021. By April, the funds were secured thanks to many parishioners and one donor's generous contribution that propelled the expansion.

Construction began at the end of the 2020–21 academic year when the school's 111 students began summer break. This fall, the school welcomed



156 students — including the sixth-grade students who will comprise the first eighth-grade graduating class two years from now.

Enhanced excellence, increased enrollment

Father Bakker said the Catholic Schools Center of Excellence has been a key partner in St. John the Baptist's growth, including its middle school expansion.

"CSCOE saw that we were implementing good plans for growth, and their support helped to slingshot us in the right direction," Father Bakker said of its significant investment over the years.

In addition to providing matching grants to support the school's fundraising efforts, CSCOE funding has supported teacher retention and academic excellence. Because the school has access to educational resources through the C-STEM Lending Library, provided by CSCOE

and the University of St. Thomas School of Engineering, school donors felt confident they could support the middle school expansion project rather than specific STEM initiatives.

To grow the community, Father Bakker proactively wrote personalized letters inviting people to join their school, purchased a bus to improve access, and worked directly with CSCOE to provide resources and support to welcome more Latino families.

Members of the school community also knew the importance of reaching out to new families, as well as existing families, to share about the school's strength and vibrance. Dream Team member Jason Schmit's daughter, Annie, will be among the first students to attend through eighth grade.

"We feel so blessed and proud ... especially for the leadership of Father Neil," Schmit said.

Lisa Anderson has always been an advocate for Catholic education and at-risk children. Her heart for both is what drove her to become a champion of the Catholic Schools Center of Excellence.

Raised in Omaha, Nebraska, Anderson credits her childhood parish and Catholic school, in addition to her parents, with giving her a solid footing to build a successful life. "For me, supporting and working in Catholic education is cellular — it runs through me," Anderson said.

It was CSCOE connections that led to Anderson's position as director of schools for the Healey Education Foundation, where she coaches Catholic school leaders on how to maintain sustainability and achieve growth by creating effective school boards. In addition to Anderson's work, her eight nieces and nephews, who all attend Catholic schools, keep Catholic education front and center.

Anderson believes fervently in CSCOE's ability to address important issues facing young Catholic school students through impactful programs like Believe and Read, and Peace of Mind. Anderson generously supports both financially.

Believe and Read, which seeks to ensure students are reading at or

above grade level by the fourth grade, dovetails with her longtime interest in literacy advocacy. Her mother instilled a love of reading in her at a young age.

"Reading opens you up to so many possibilities," Anderson said. "Once you can read, then learning becomes that much easier. And the enjoyment of reading makes you a stronger learner."

This love of reading inspired her to become one of the first people to sponsor Believe and Read in a Catholic school. (Read more about Believe and Read on page 6.)

The mental health and wellness resources offered through Peace of Mind also appeal to her because of an early life lesson from her father about the importance of a supportive family and community. Since then, she's been passionate about helping children who lack those support networks, which Catholic schools provide.

"I can't think of any kids who are more at risk than those without a faith life," Anderson said. "For kids, this is *the* time to reach them, *the* time to let them know that they are lovable and capable and a child of God. That's why I support Catholic education."




